CHEESE ONION MORSELS

Submitted by Karen Q.

- 1-pound old cheese, grated
- ½ cup butter
- ½ cup water
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. sugar
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- ½ tsp. paprika
- ½ cup chopped onion

Mix together. Mixture will be stiff. (I use my hands to mix all ingredients together.) Roll into balls and press with a fork. Sprinkle with dried parsley. Bake at 350° for 15 minutes.



Old English Rose

Started in the late 80's and finished in 2001, this is the quilt that has taken me the longest to complete.

A traditional pattern by Patricia Cox, the central block surrounded by blocks and borders called for traditional colours of reds and greens.

Hand quilted, all the quilting metifs are feather patterns.

motifs are feather patterns that compliment the overall feeling of the quilt.





Painted Daisy Chain

After winning the blocks in a Block of The Month ' draw and doing five more blocks, I began to play with the layout of this quilt. The blocks were designed by Barb Reynolds who helped with the half blocks and the borders.

Upon completing the quilt, I was removing the pencil lines from the quilting motif when one of the teal fabrics ran. The hummingbird, just off centre, was a good solution to solving the problem. This quilt won Excellence in Workmanship in CQA show 2003. Many thanks to Barb and The Kingston Heirloom Quilters.




Karen would also like to finish this quilt. It is recorded now so pressure on!

They boarded the bus and checked the next address.


More quilts to be made, another quilter in distress.

Happy quilting to all and to all a good night!


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
A recent read from our local library, "Flora's Fieldworkers" by Anne Shteir had an interesting chapter by Vanessa Nicholas "Slips and Seeds: Botany and Horticulture in Two Nineteenth-Century Canadian Quilts" which looked at two heritage quilts, Elizabeth Bell's "Fallowfield Quilt" and an Ontario coverlet made by Margaret McCrum. The Fallowfield quilt (1820) belongs to the Agnes Etherington Heritage Collection.

Also, of interest Nicholas has listed in her sources a forthcoming publication, *Canadian Quilts and Their Makers*, Vancouver: UBC Press, by Lisa Binkley, which appears to be Binkley's dissertation at Queen's in 2016.




