# A Tribute to Phyllis Vanhorne



We have lost another great quilter. Phyllis Vanhorne, a founding member of the Kingston Heirloom Quilters, passed on March 12, 2024, one day from her 102nd birthday!

She was an avid quilter especially loving the Log Cabin pattern. Phyllis first became involved in quilting during World War II. She worked on Red Cross quilts which were sent overseas, mainly to Britain. Over the years, quilting became her passion, and she entered quilts in local fairs (eventually becoming a judge), taught quilting classes, attended the first organizational meeting of the Canadian Quilters Association in Toronto, and travelled across Canada and the US to attend conventions. Lancaster, Pennsylvania was a favourite spot for fabric shopping and quilt shows.

She would work on commission for others. In the 70's, Kim Ondaatje saw one of her quilts at the fair and asked if she would make quilts for "Tradition Plus One", an exhibit she was mounting for the Agnes Etherington Arts Centre that travelled across Canada. She prevailed upon the late Margaret Rhodes and Diane Berry to be involved as well.

Then, Ludy Strauss, a Californian who vacationed in this area, mounted another exhibit. Ludy was elated when Phyllis agreed to turn her paintings and the designs from ten contemporary artists, into quilts. Phyllis again enlisted the help of the late Margaret Rhodes, Diane Berry, and another lady as there were many quilts and they wanted duplicates. Some of these modern quilts, made in the early 70's, are now in the International Quilt Museum in Lincoln, Nebraska. The stories about painters' assumptions about fabrics were hilarious. There were learning curves on both sides; initially, of course, the painters didn't understand what could be done with fabric, needle, and thread, but they worked it out together.

One fun story we like to remember: In recent years, Phyllis purchased a brand-new sewing machine. She came to an Heirloom meeting afterwards and told us that she had paid as much for the sewing machine as she and her husband had paid for the family farm back in 1949! Imagine!

Phyllis was featured in the May16, 2012 Kingston Profile magazine. Her quilt, "Golden Wedding Ring" was on the cover. Phyllis was a featured quilter at Quilts Kingston 2012. On the right, Phyllis is shown with her log cabin quilt at the 2023 show.

Phyllis not only made each of her four children quilts to celebrate their marriages, but she also made one for each of her ten grandchildren. At her funeral, her quilts were reunited on the back of the Chapel's benches.

And so it is with great sadness that we say goodbye to our fellow quilter and friend, Phyllis. She will be missed.


