Also. on the 7<sup>th</sup> was Simone's demonstration of constructing the wrist pincushions shown by our hand models Karen and Lyn.


May 21<sup>st</sup> Simone was the presenter.

Most of the quilts Jen makes are hand quilted as she admits to not being able to sew straight on a machine. If a quilt is made for a quilt along she will turn it over for machine quilting.

The ones hosting at Mad About Patchwork were hospitable and fun as well. They had decorated the walls with their own versions of Jen's patterns and danced each of Jen's quilts down the aisle for a closer look.


All exhibitors must be a current member of the Kingston & District Agricultural Society as of Sept. 1, 2024, for a fee of \$5.00 per year.




If you are in the Brockville area there is a small exhibit of eight or nine quilts in the local museum. Please check their website for times and location.

Come out to the Friendly Town of Almonte on September 7th and 8th for the Mississippi Valley Textile Museum's 29th Annual Fibrefest. Hosted at three locations: the Almonte Community Centre, Almonte Old Town Hall, and the Mississippi Valley Textile Museum. Local guilds will demonstrate spinning, knitting, weaving, rug hooking, lacemaking, smocking and quilting. Vendors include finished fibre goods and other textile related supplies from across the province, as well as quilt shops and alpaca farms. Admission to Fibrefest is \$5.00 per day, which gives you access to all three sites.
