Candlelight Quilt 2017 Francine LeBlanc

This quilt was long in the making as most quilts are when you put your heart and soul into the making of one.

Course given at Stitch by Stitch with Debbie Finn as instructor. The pattern by KennyKreations contains 13 candlestick embroidered blocks each of which is wrapped in a warm and cozy log cabin block. The blocks are then joined together on point with more log cabin blocks and contrasting chain. As wonderful as this combination is, it then appears to float in a beautiful turquoise border. Robinson-Anton Jewel tone threads were used and batik fabrics all purchased at Stitch by Stitch. Nancy Holden was the long arm quilter who did a fabulous custom quilting. This by far is one of my favorite quilts.



A Visit to The Museum of Lennox and Addington in May 2025



Please note this exhibit is now over but the passage below is from the website which is worth visiting to read full article.

Invisible Items at the Museum - Museum of Lennox & Addington

The current display of crazy quilts in the main hall gallery helps to illustrate this point. The quilts are beautiful items and fine examples the handwork done by women and girls in in the 18 and 19 hundreds, but that is not the reason they are in the collection. You have to read the note at the lower corner of each quilt to understand the story of the person who made the quilt or who the quilt was made for to understand the local tie and the story it tells. The quilts are in the collection because of the local tie. The stories behind the quilts goes much farther than the simple local tie. The quilts represent the reuse of pieces of fabric left over from sewing new clothes or saving fabric from worn out clothes, something that every household would be doing at that time. There may well be stories behind each piece of fabric included in the quilt. Jim Sova




